

Course Description

The Regional Venture Capital Immersion (also called VCIC Fellows) provides a selected group of MBA and undergraduate students a fun, practical and interactive opportunity to study venture capital and entrepreneurship by traveling to two different entrepreneurial regions of the United States and Canada. This course builds on the lessons taught in several other classes at Kenan-Flagler on the theory and fundamentals of venture capital, entrepreneurial finance, due diligence and VC deal structure. The Regional Venture Capital Immersion offers a unique opportunity to see these concepts put into action outside of the traditional classroom with real professionals working on live case studies.

Students will also build their professional networks through the connections they make at these daylong events, interacting with venture capitalists, startup founders, entreprenerial staff and faculty, and leading venture-driven students from top universities and business programs.

UNC Kenan-Flagler's role as coordinator of the global Venture Capital Investment Competition (VCIC) offers unique access for our students to over a dozen different venture communities, such as Silicon Valley, Boston, New York, Los Angeles, Chicago, Washington, DC, Austin, Boulder, Atlanta,, Baltimore... (varies by year, see regional bracket at www.vcic.org (https://www.vcic.org) for this year's regions).

Course Goals

The overarching goal of this course is to add practical and current knowledge to the foundation taught in other entrepreneurship and venture capital courses, leading to a deeper understanding of how venture capital plays an integral role in the commercialization of disruptive technologies in our economy.

Three key areas of focus are:

- Startup Pitches: students will learn what investors are looking for in startup pitches and due diligence. Over the course of two events, students will observe six startup pitches and a dozen due diligence sessions.
- **Deal Structure**: students will learn how VCs think about deal structure by observing the the investors' discussions of the startups, including how they would structure equity deal for the participating startups. Further, students will observe the term sheets submitted by teams, as well as the feedback they receive from investors.
- **Relationships**: students will be immersed in a web of complex relationships between founders and investors and will witness the importance of long-term relationships in the venture capital ecosystem.

Another broad goal of this course is to teach students how to think like venture capitalists, that is, to think like investors when assessing new opportunities, whether in startups or in larger organizations. Venture capitalists are professionals charged with making Go/No-Go decisions about innovative disruptions every day. Students will learn from VCs about how to assess opportunity and mitigate risk.

Specific Learning Objectives at Events

Each VCIC event includes many of the activities that make up the VC investment process. Students observe startup pitches, due diligence sessions, analysis from VCs and simulated partner meetings. Listed below chronologically as they occur at the event, each activity has specific learning objectives:

- 9AM: Startup Pitches. Because VCIC events utilize local startups, students learn which types of startups are currently receiving venture funding in different geographical regions. Further, through observing numerous startup pitches, students learn best practices in creating effective venture presentations.
- 10AM: Due Diligence. Students observe teams from six top MBA or undergraduate programs interacting with founders in 14-minute due diligence sessions. These brief discussions run the gamut of the business school core curriculum: strategy, finance, operations, marketing, technology, communications, accounting and leadership. It is a true integrative exercise with a live case study. Our students benefit from watching the various strategies employed by teams tackling these complex

issues. Further, and perhaps more importantly, our students observe the interactions between VCs and founders when the competing teams have left the room, an invaluable lesson on two fronts. First, students hear from the professionals about what they perceive to be the critical issues. Secondly, students are observing relationship-building between investors and founders. These relationships are nuanced and complex. The human interactions at VCIC are an integral part of the learning.

- 12:30PM: Judge Deal Discussion. The most important hour of the day! Over lunch our students observe the judges as they hold an open discussion, VC to VC, about the investment opportunities (startups) participating in the event. This is real-time deal analysis by professionals covering all aspects of a venture deal. This is a profoundly instructional and unique session. There is no other place where students would have access to this kind of conversation: investors explaining how and why they do what they do. Once again, the human interactions are also an important lesson. Students observe how these professionals, who are both competitors and collaborators, posture and position while assessing deals.
- 1:30PM: Partner Meetings. After lunch, each competing team meets with the judging panel to pitch the deal they have chosen. Again, our students gain insights from seeing a variety of approaches to these complex interactions, which again integrate MBA core learning across disciplines. These are not PowerPoint presentations followed by Q&A. Rather, these are discussions around a boardroom table designed to simulate a partner meeting in which a junior partner (the MBA team) is pitching a deal to senior partners. This creates a much more dynamic interaction between competing teams and VC judges.

Apprenticeship Methodology: Repeat with New Variables

The core of the learning will come from traveling to two (2) VCIC Regional Finals. Each event is a unique learning opportunity with different variables:

- Different startups from different industries
- Different student teams from different top programs
- · Different venture capitalists
- Different fund profile as part of the simulation
- Different geographical locations with different venture trends.

Seminar Class Sessions

While the Regional VC Immersion is structured somewhat like GIEs, there are significant differences and advantages. First, students will be traveling on two weekends *during* the term, rather than at the end. Second, different students will study and travel to different regions, rather than everyone studying the same geography. Our regular classroom sessions will be structured as seminar-style discussions about what was learned at VCIC events over the weekend. Since the theory is covered in other courses, the focus here will be on the application of the theory, particularly the current trends in the industry.

Grading

Participation - 25%

Do all assignments in a timely and thoughtful manner. Always come to class prepared and eager to engage in our seminar-style class discussions.

• Pre-Event Reports (2) - 25%

For each VCIC trip, you will perform some due diligence on startups and judges who will be present at the event using the VCIC Fellows **Pre-Event Report template** \Rightarrow

Post-Event Reports (2) - 25%

After each trip, you will submit a <u>Post-Event Report</u> \Rightarrow (https://docs.google.com/document/d/1b10z9m3-XQZmzmMi_9EOgceUTVHdTJd7l39c-ID45ic/copy) that summarizes your key take-aways from the event in preparation for our seminar discussion in class.

Final Reflective Essay - 25%

A 1,500-2,500 word essay explaining what you've learned about venture capital and entrepreneurship as a result of traveling to your regional VCIC events, and how those lessons may impact your career going forward.
